Habitat's work is made possible through public sector investment.

Federal funding is often the first source of funding for a Habitat project and leverages a significant return on investment through private support from individual donors, faith congregations, foundations, and corporations.

- HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) provides formula grants to states and localities that communities use in partnership with local nonprofit groups, including Habitat affiliates, to fund a wide range of affordable housing activities.
- Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) provides grants for critical home repairs vital to the health and safety of low-income homeowners, and accessibility modifications for seniors and those with disabilities.
- Veterans Housing and Repair Modification Program (VHRMP) – provides grants to provide accessibility modifications or critical repairs to homes owned by low-income veterans.
